

program highlight: aspire

Aspire is a recreation program for children on the Autism Spectrum where children enjoy activities that encourage development of communication and social skills through modeling and practice. This spring, children in our Aspire Program visited the Lebanon Police Department as part of our Special Needs Information Program (SNIP). At the visit, we met the K9 Unit, explored the station, and most importantly, supported positive relationship development between emergency responders and community members with disabilities.

SNIP is a free safety tool. Families or caregivers can voluntarily provide information about individuals with special needs in the secure, confidential online database. The information is available to emergency responders when needed to help people with special needs during an encounter with emergency responders. The information can save precious time in an emergency and help improve the safety of people with disabilities.

Happenings is a monthly social activities program for adults with special needs. Activities include dances, music fun nights, apple picking and other events throughout the year. People with disabilities in our community are prone to isolation, loneliness, and social difficulties which has significant impact on their happiness, health, and overall well-being. Happenings offers a different approach to the provision of services with an emphasis on the development of relationships, friendships, and joy.

Over the years at least 8,000 adventures have been enjoyed by adults with special needs. By supporting these vital programs, you are supporting lifelong friendships with peers while creating a sense of belonging which improves self-advocacy and social relationships.

To help fill this gap, Sylvia worked with SNSC to develop Art Lab, a weekly creative art making class implemented collaboratively with AVA Art Gallery.



program highlight: pesap

Parent Educational Support and Advocacy Program (PESAP) supports parents in all aspects of the special education and Section 504 process to promote understanding of the relevant state and federal rules, regulations while supporting parents in clarifying their ideas and concerns regarding their child's education.

Additionally, in response to parent requests, we are providing emotional and informational support through a peer to peer support group. Parents, with the shared experience of disability in the family, provide a unique form of support that only another parent who has "been there" can provide. Peer support from families with years of experience is often the most valuable way to provide emotional support and practical information to parents in need.




Operating Revenue by Source

DEAR FRIENDS OF SNSC,

The last 40 years have been awe-inspiring as our community and our nation have journeyed towards equal opportunities for children and adults with special needs. Back in the seventies, having your child with a high level of special needs stay in your home, access public schools and other community resources was a new concept. Before that, 1.75 million children with disabilities were completely excluded from public schools and there was little awareness or acceptance of their needs in the community. People with disabilities did not have ready access to public transportation, telephones, bathrooms, and stores. Buildings with stairs offered no entry for people with certain physical disabilities, and attitudes created even tougher barriers and a sense of isolation, not just for people with disabilities, but for their families too.

Today, we are indeed on the cusp of being able to affect wide, deep, and sustained change. Drawing on our broad and diverse experiences as parents, professionals, disability rights advocates, and community members, we are positioned to effectively transform the culture of our community.
